More on the Memorial Garden Box and Plaque

The last issue of FOSCA news carried an article about the addition to the grounds of Shalom Court, of a small elevated garden. The garden was funded by Adele and Wally Hirsh and constructed by their son-in-law, Pete Jaspers.

Margot Hirsh and Martha Horn, sisters-in-law, were residents at Shalom Court from 1987 until they passed away, a few months apart, both aged 96. They had been residents for 17 years. Fleeing from Nazi Germany, Margot arrived in New Zealand, in November 1938. Her husband Ernst, and two small sons were with her. The family first settled in Milton, South Otago, and after 10 years there moved to Dunedin. Ernst became the acting Rabbi for the Dunedin Jewish community from then for the next 40 years. He was the eldest in a family of 6 and did his best to rescue other members of that family from the strengthening antisemitic grip of the Nazis. Martha, (Ernst's younger sister) and her husband Joe, followed and were sailing to New Zealand in May 1939 when the 2nd World war broke out. They were interred in Colombo for a short time. But then managed to travel on to New Zealand.

Margot and Ernst, Martha and Joe, were a strong "foursome" who played a major role in the well-being of the Dunedin Jewish Community and the large number of Jewish students studying at Otago university, the only university in New Zealand at that time, with a medical school, dental school, home science, mining engineering et al. They did this with love and passion for almost half a century. Martha and Joe did not have any children, so they accommodated Jewish students year after year. Strong bonds were established with the students who were with Martha and Joe for at least 5 years. The Hirshes and Horns lived in humble homes, quite close to each other in Kaikorai Valley and Wakari.

Martha and Margot were very capable in the sewing crafts. When the opportunity arose to purchase the lovely haberdashery store in neighbouring Roslyn, the families jumped at it. The ladies grew this business to a very pivotal standing in this hill suburb. They became very well-known and widely respected. After some years running Roslyn Draperies, and at the age of 78, they retired. Meanwhile Wally (Margot's son) and his wife Adele, had moved to Auckland from Wellington, for Wally to take up the position of Race Relations Conciliator. In the intervening years both Margot and Martha had become widows and were living together in a lovely flat on Highgate. On a visit to Auckland in 1986, family discussions were held about the future for Martha and Margot. The group visited Shalom court and were very impressed. It took only a couple of weeks to make the decision to move north and this happened in 1987.

It was the right decision. The ladies settled in at shalom court almost immediately and were very happy with their spacious accommodation. They began their long stay in the 2 bedroom and 1 sitting room, unit 16 out the back. After a number of years there they moved to another 2 bedroom apartment which had to be removed when the Albert house building project began. Their final move was to adjoining rooms in Philipp house. They were happy in all 3 spaces. They were always complimentary about the quality of care and nursing. They took an active part in the activities on offer and keenly supported anything which helped make their home a Jewish home. Their lives were enriched by being at Shalom Court for so many years and they in turn contributed to life there too. Margot will be remembered for her "deutsche punctlishkeit" (clock watching) and her generosity. Martha will be remembered for her calm and gentle disposition.

Now, when we harvest tomatoes, cucumbers, lettuce, silver beet, red peppers and other vegetables, we will remember them and their many years of contentment, great care and happiness at Shalom Court.




