From the Chair

Krishna who took over as clinical head nurse after Mary left last year, has worked tirelessly in this very difficult role – she has, however, decided to spend more time with her family who have recently arrived from Fiji. Juliette will talk more about the staffing side of Shalom Court.

My personal thanks to Juliette from HBH, as well as Jasper, Bonnie and Sachin who have been regulars here (especially Juliette and Jasper) and are keeping things well in hand. Juliette is often here until late in the evening, chatting with staff and working on so much (too much to mention in this newsletter). With Covid times, we have had to implement some difficult rules by not letting our residents leave unless for medical appointments, but still allowing visitors in. This has just been changed with Covid rules and residents can leave for outside visits. We have had no resident get sick with Covid which is a huge achievement in NZ's rest homes. Some of our staff did succumb to Covid, however, but through careful management, they have all recovered after time off.

During the past few months we have unfortunately lost 3 residents. The first was Peter Jackson who had been in Room 1, Philip House as a palliative care resident. Then a few weeks ago Irene Levy passed away after being here for 9 years. I went to Irene's funeral which was very special, and Lima (one of our carers) spoke about Irene and their special relationship. Just very recently (as I write this), we lost Roy Turner who at the age of 97 had only been with us for 2 weeks. It is always extremely sad to see much loved residents depart, but it is also amazing to see the exemplary care they have received here at Shalom Court.

I would like to add that Rachel Denyss left us a few weeks ago to Kingfisher House. Rachel was an icon here at Shalom Court for quite a few years.

Marion, our wonderful accounts lady, is presently in Auckland Hospital after major surgery, and will be returning to work only in around 3 months. Roberta has been employed in the interim to make sure our accounts are all kept in check. Sachin (Accountant from HBH) is helping with this.

Karlo, our amazing caregiver of 30 years and has also undergone surgery, and is hoping to come back eventually. However, I think her recovery will take a little while yet.

Part of our new Eden philosophy was to get animals and besides Juliette's adorable two chihuahuas of whom you will see photos, we got two rescue adult cats. However, as I write this, they have decided that the garden and beyond is a better place for them, and we are hoping that eventually they will come back inside... watch this space.

With this newsletter is a renewal form for FOSCA membership, and I do hope you will all renew your memberships as you are an integral part of the Shalom Court family. I am always available to have a chat, so if you would like to get hold of me, please ring Shalom Court and ask for my contact details.

With the winter months, I am sure that my daily place at Shalom Court will be reduced with the employment of a new head nurse (Marc) and others. I have a new career (at the sprightly age of 66) as a Restorative Justice facilitator which I will be working at more and more.

Finally, I'd like to thank each and every one of you for your interest and support in Shalom Court. We all have history here and it is only with our combined efforts will we be able to continue providing the care for our friends and families.

This includes new staff (with new uniforms for everyone), training for staff, refurbishing of cottages 1 and 2 (in front of the lower lounge), the two new gardens and tidying up of others, Passover, Easter, Mother's Day and we are already working on future functions and celebrations.

Realistically we need to promote Shalom Court in the general community, and **Chris Harris** is working with a specialist in the marketing field to get this up and running. Thank you to Chris who also edits this FOSCA newsletter for his dedication and hard work.

Congratulations to Caleb Parker (Board treasurer) on the birth of his second child, a son, Shaiyah (or Shai) – named after my later father, Sol Filler. Caleb has been very busy with two small children at home, but his input and expertise as treasurer is ongoing and greatly appreciated.



Mazel Tov also to **Inge Kronquist** on her 60th birthday milestone. Inge is always keen to be part of what is happening at Shalom Court, and was extremely helpful when getting a physio back at Shalom Court after 6 months of no one. Positive changes, happier residents

As you may know, HBH Senior Living officially took over the management of Shalom Court in early February this year. Since then we've introduced some exciting new initiatives, which we're delighted to share with you.

Firstly, some great news ... we're pleased to announce the appointment of new registered and enrolled nurses, including our new Nurse Manager, Marc Agusto. He is supported by Jennifer Pacleb and Toni Wong, both of whom are very experienced nurses who have recently joined us as part of our successful recruitment drive. Jennifer has previously worked in a Jewish facility in New York. All of our RNs currently live in the local area. Jasmin is due to join us in late June and will be leading our wonderful night team.

We've also started adopting the Eden Alternative philosophy, a philosophy of care that puts the needs of older people at the centre of everything we do. One of the ten principles of Eden focuses on making aged care facilities more like a home - with plants, animals, more colour, less institutionalised uniforms, and more home-like furniture. Another is involving residents and staff in decisions - it's your home, so it's important that you have a say in how it's run.

Not only that, new systems have been put in place for human resources, communications, administration and finance with support of HBH Sachin Adkar (our Finance & IT Manager) and Roberta (our interim Accounts Manager), plus we're setting up new systems to ensure consistent quality of care and communication, as well as an improved admission and welcome process.

Management of Shalom Court will be overseen by myself, (Group GM - Clinical Quality) and Jasper Young, (Group Services Manager - Clinical & Community). There are more positive changes to come, so watch this space for the next update!

Extracts from her eulogy as read by her son, Ellis

Irene was born in February 1930 in Cairo Egypt, the eldest of two children and the family was a loving Jewish family in an Arab country – but life was good.

In 1950 she was married but by 1956 the family was forced to leave their home country due to political unrest and seek refugee status in the UK, taking only what they could carry and none of their assets – they had to basically start over which in a new country and not knowing the language was hard.

Irene had three sons (having lost two children in child birth) followed by the last son a few years later.

Irene worked at the primary school as a dinner lady and later she worked in retail at Brent Cross (at the time the largest indoor mall in the UK) before eventually moving to NZ.

Over the years age and ill health began to be a problem – two broken hips and a stomach complaint slowed her down and about 10 years ago she moved to Shalom Court Rest Home

Irene's love for all things kitsch has never waned (in fact it accelerated) and she was protective of her family and was a friend to everyone

She had a big heart, she was a great mum, a fantastic Nana / Grandma to Joshua, Benjamin, Rabiya and Yamen.

Her sons are confident that when she meets their father she will tell him all about the grandchildren and together will watch and guide them as they grow to be as loving as they were with their sons.

So hopefully you have learned a bit more about Irene and that it has made you smile –

We hope that her funeral will be not so much mourning but a celebration of who she was.


